



Chaplain's Report



A Firm Commitment

Message for 6/30/13 13th Sunday in OT (C)



When Jesus calls us to follow him, he expects that we will make a firm commitment to him and follow him unreservedly, and not just when it is only convenient for us to do so. For us that can be most difficult at times because we are sometimes afraid to make our commitment firm. Yes, we are afraid of what others might think of us if we choose to follow Jesus unreservedly. We are afraid we might hurt someone's feelings if we prefer Jesus' way rather than theirs. If we are truly honest with ourselves, we must admit that our faith is wishy-washy at times when we fail to stand up and be counted as a committed Christian. The truth hurts at times, but it sets us free to follow Jesus unreservedly. Paul's words to the Galatians in our second reading (Gal 5:1,13-18) spells out this firm commitment quite clearly: "Brothers and sisters: It was for liberty that Christ freed us. So stand firm, and do not take on the yoke of slavery a second time. Remember that you were called for freedom, brothers and sisters. But do not use this freedom as an opportunity for the flesh; rather, serve one another through love. For the whole law is fulfilled in one statement, namely, You shall love your neighbor as yourself. But if you go on biting and devouring one another, beware that you are not consumed by one another. I say, then: live by the Spirit and you will certainly not gratify the desire of the flesh. For the flesh has desires against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh; these are opposed to each other, so that you may not do what you want. But if you are guided by the Spirit, you are not under the law."

Similarly, notice how Elisha begged off from following Elijah unreservedly in the first reading from the first book of Kings (1 Kgs 19:16-21): "Elijah went over to him and threw his cloak over him. Elisha left the oxen, ran after Elijah, and said, "Please, let me kiss my father and mother goodbye, and I will follow you." Elijah answered, "Go back! Have I done anything to you?" Elisha left him, and taking the yoke of oxen, slaughtered them; he used the plowing equipment for fuel to boil their flesh, and gave it to his people to eat. Then Elisha left and followed Elijah as his attendant." (Unreservedly) In this case, we see how Elisha disposed of everything he owned, paid respect to his family, and then followed Elijah unreservedly. When Elijah threw his cloak over Elisha, that represented the transmitting of Elijah's charism of prophecy to Elisha. This passage is similar to today's gospel in Luke (Lk 9:51-62) when Jesus calls his disciples to follow him: "As they were proceeding on their journey someone said to Jesus, "I will follow you wherever you go." Jesus answered him, "Foxes have dens and birds of the sky have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to rest his head." And to another he said, "Follow me." But he replied, "Lord, let me go first and bury my father." But he answered him, "Let the dead bury their dead. But you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God." And another said, "I will follow you, Lord, but first let me say farewell to my family at home." To him Jesus said, "No one who sets a hand to the plow and looks to what was left behind is fit for the kingdom of God." God's word to

Iconoclasm

Recently my wife and I were invited to attend a performance of "Fiddler on the Roof, Jr." put on by the Willow Creek Community Church Special Friends ministry. Located in South Barrington, Willow Creek is accurately described as a non-denominational, protestant, mega-church. As suggested by the name of the ministry, the performers were special needs kids, helped along by their peer menters

As any Knight who has helped out with the Special Olympics can tell you, it is great to see these kids given the opportunity to take part in such events. And we would be remiss not to appreciate the very real, and very Christ-like outreach Willow Creek promotes through this and its many other ministries.

That being said, I could not help but notice a little irony as the performance began. Willow Creek has a comfortable auditorium with stage, lighting, sound, and video that could easily be the envy of many a lesser theater. The impressive theater, while being well suited to performance, is also their worship space; and yet, there is nary so much as a cross to be found. So while the performers joyously opened with the song "Tradition," noticeably absent to me was any symbol of Christian tradition. No altar. No statues. No iconography.

In the wake of the Reformation, as the various protestant factions sought to further distance and distinguish themselves from the Catholic Church, the use of images and statues came to be eliminated, having been deemed idolatrous. Such an idea was far from novel in the sixteenth century however. Indeed the Church had previously battled that same idea 800 years earlier.

Emperor Leo III condemned the use of icons in 730 and initiated a crisis in the Eastern (Catholic) Church known as Iconoclasm. The

us in these narratives are quite clear: "Accept the challenge to be a resolute Christian."

Responsorial Psalm 16:1-11 sums up this commitment to follow the Lord unreservedly: R. (cf. 5a) "You are my inheritance, O Lord. Keep me, O God, for in you I take refuge; I say to the LORD, "My Lord are you. O LORD, my allotted portion and my cup, you it is who hold fast my lot." I bless the LORD who counsels me; even in the night my heart exhorts me. I set the LORD ever before me; with him at my right hand I shall not be disturbed. Therefore my heart is glad and my soul rejoices, my body, too, abides in confidence because you will not abandon my soul to the netherworld, nor will you suffer your faithful one to undergo corruption. You will show me the path to life, fullness of joys in your presence, the delights at your right hand forever."

word means "image-breaking" and came into use to because the proponents of this idea would literally break the icons used in some churches. Pope St. Gregory II defied Leo in upholding the use of icons much to the ire of the emperor. In fact, Leo tried to have Gregory arrested; but the fleet he sent to do so, wrecked along the way.

The controversy raged for decades. In 787 the Second Council of Nicaea reversed Leo's ruling but that did not end the crisis. The influence went back and forth between the opposing sides until finally icons were restored permanently in 843 under Empress Theodora

Icons serve a wonderful purpose. Paragraph 1160 of the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) puts it this way:

Christian iconography expresses in images the same Gospel message that Scripture communicates by words. Image and word illuminate each other:

In the same paragraph, the CCC quotes from the document put out by the Second Council of Nicaea in 787. In essence, the Council affirmed both the written and unwritten traditions of the Church, including representational artwork.

Apply Your Faith

On a short vacation in Austria a couple of years ago, I noticed iconography depicted on the exteriors of many buildings and the ubiquitous presence of little shrines throughout the land, including the mountainside farm of my wife's relatives, where we stayed overnight. When I asked why they had the shrine out there in the field the woman said that when she's working she can glance over to it and get a good feeling.

That is a pretty succinct way of extolling the benefit of keeping our minds on God. I encourage you to incorporate icons throughout your home. Hang a beautiful picture on a wall; maybe put a little Marian shrine in your garden. And as you go about your daily chores, look to those images and bask in the good feeling they engender.

These truths, in order of priority are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. Without Liberty the population is not free to pursue happiness and without Life, there is no liberty.

The first unalienable Right, the Right to Life is under attack by the government! Any law or ruling that does not

protect life is a ruling against life! The Catholic Church teaches in the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) in paragraph 2270 that life begins at the point of conception and must be respected and protected.




